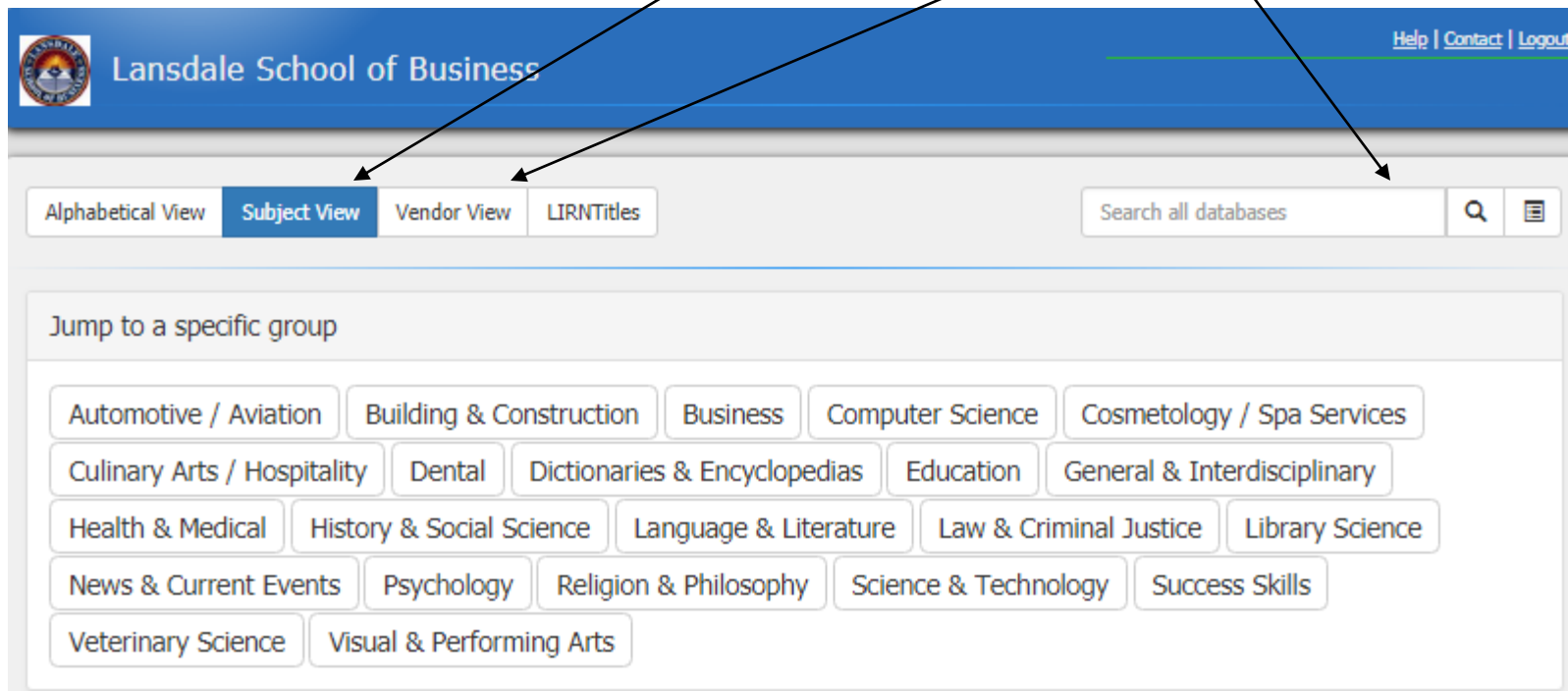

The LIRN search engine allows the user to choose a Subject View search where databases are grouped according to subject and can be searched individually, Vendor View search where databases are organized by vendor, or the LIRN Search federated search that performs a search over all or selected databases simultaneously.

1. Apple Lawsuit Against Samsung Over Tablets Revisited

A U.S. appeals court has revived a patent infringement case Apple (AAPL) had filed against Samsung, opening the door for Apple to try to block the domestic sale of Samsung tablets. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit ruled Monday that a judge in a district court in California had erred by deciding that Apple failed to show that it was likely to win on the merits of the case, Reuters reported. The appeals court sent the lawsuit back.

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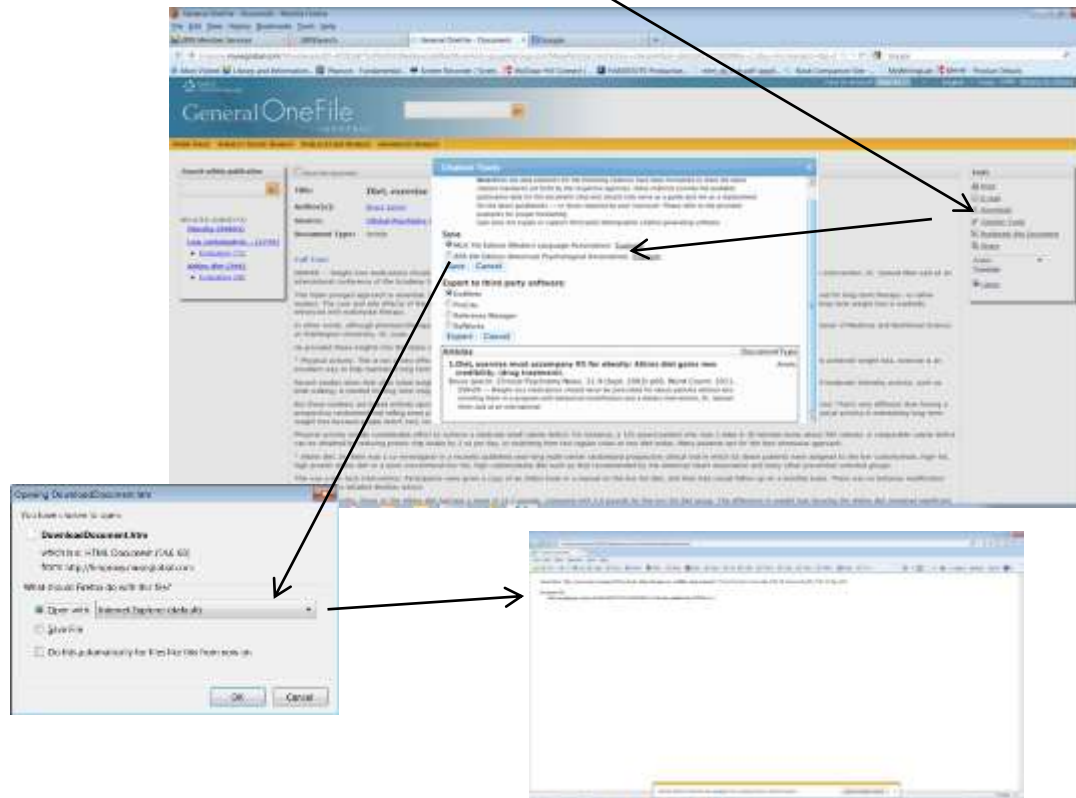

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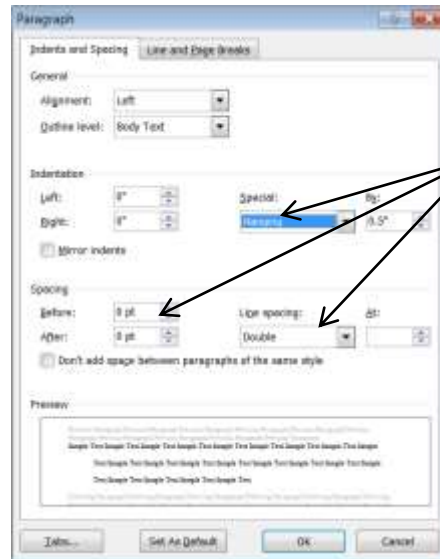
